

FOREIGN CARRIER PERMIT APPLICATION

Thank you for your interest in operating into the Cayman Islands. Please note that all air transport operations into the Cayman Islands are subject to regulation under the UK's Air Navigation (Overseas Territories) Order, AN(OT)O 2013 and as amended and updated from time to time. In particular Article 135 which provides that all foreign registered aircraft operating into the territory for valuable consideration be licensed to do so by the UK Secretary of State. This authorization has been delegated (as of September 2004) to the Governor and thereby to the Director-General of Civil Aviation for the Cayman Islands.

Please complete the following application and return it, together with the required supporting documentation allowing a minimum of 48 hours (business days) for the processing of a Foreign Carrier Permit. In order to be granted, all supporting documentation, as listed below, must be submitted at time of application.

5. GADSS (Global Aeronautical Distress and Safety System) Compliance with Annex 6 — Operation of Aircraft, Part I, **International Commercial Air Transport** Aeroplanes; 6.18 Location of an Aeroplane in Distress. If a State has enacted legislation giving effect to the Standard and an operator is noncompliant, it is the responsibility of the State of the Operator to issue an exemption. In such cases, we-as the receiving State—would require evidence of compliance or of a duly issued exemption before granting a permit. It should be noted that the United States has filed a difference under Article 38 of the Convention, making the Standard inapplicable to U.S.-registered aircraft.

- 6. The airline/operator shall comply with Standard 2.1.10.1 and 1.2.5.2.3 of Annex 1 of the Chicago Convention when operating Air Transport Operations into the territory. Below is a summary of the key elements of this standard:
 - a. A Contracting State, having issued pilot licenses, shall not permit the holders thereof to act as pilot of an aircraft engaged in international transport commercial air operations if the license holders have attained their 60th birthday or, in the case of operations with more than one pilot, their 65th birthday; and
 - b. When the holders of flight crew licenses are engaged in commercial air transport operations and have passed their 60th birthday, the medical validity period shall be, reduced to six (6) months.

Seasons for scheduled permits: Permits issued to scheduled carriers follow the IATA seasons of summer and winter; therefore, summer permits are valid from the last Sunday of March until the last Saturday of October, and winter permits are valid from the last Sunday of October thru to the last Saturday of March.

- * Blanket Permits: Blanket permits can be issued for a period of 6 months. At the time of application, the applicant must provide all required documents listed in Form A1 for all aircraft to be used. Blanket permits will be issued with a specific permit number for the operator and should be copied and carried on the aircraft(s) listed at all times. If the operator has more than one aircraft which they will be using the aircrafts' registration numbers will be listed on the permit. These permits are billed in advance and offer unlimited flights into and out of the Cayman Islands for the duration of the permit for the specific aircraft listed on the permits.
- **Verification Letters: Verification letters are valid for six months from January June & July December. The same documentation required for a blanket permit is required for a verification letter and once all paperwork is in order a verification letter can be issued. A copy of the verification letter must also be carried by all aircraft listed at all times. When the operator needs to operate a flight, a request is sent to the handling agent which must contain flight details (tail, operating times, etc.), a copy of the verification letter and a manifest or gendec. A monthly log must be submitted to permits@caacayman.com by the 2nd of the following month listing all live operations into or out of the Cayman Islands, the aircraft tail, date of operation and city pairs. This log will be compared to statistics received from the handlers and the Cayman Islands Airports Authority. An invoice will then be generated for all flights operated, which must be settled upon receipt. The email notification for any flight giving the date of operation and aircraft registration must be sent to permits@caacayman.com

Required Checklist as related to the Carriage of Dangerous Goods.

All documents must be provided in English or a certified translation along with certified copies of originals

- A copy of the permission/approval/certificate granted to the operator by the competent authority of the state permitting the transport of dangerous goods
- > Operator specifications 'Ops Specs' which cover the transportation of dangerous goods (if applicable)
- A copy of the operations manual section that covers dangerous goods
- ➤ A copy of the operator's training programme for dangerous goods
- ➤ A copy of the contract/agreement with local handling agent
- A list of the type of dangerous goods (un number, proper shipping name and quantity including the type of packaging) to be transported
- ➤ If applicable, any supplementary sheets
